The President called the meeting to order at 2.33 pm after a quorum of 60 attendees had been attained.

OPENING REMARKS

In his opening address, Dr Loh gave a short overview of what College had done in the past years. He remarked that on the whole, the profile of the College had improved, particularly in the past year. Activities in *Undergraduate Teaching, Continuing Medical Education (CME)* and *Vocational Training* have gained recognition by the School of Postgraduate Medical Studies, National University of Singapore, the Ministry of Health and the Singapore Medical Council.

On Undergraduate Teaching, Chairman informed the House that the Dean of the Medical Faculty, National University of Singapore had written to College to request for names of its senior members to be its clinical bed-side tutors.

The College's Continuing Medical Education (CME) Committee had been very active in the past year. He commended the CME Committee members and its Chairman for their efforts. The House was informed that College, together with the Academy of Medicine, Singapore, had been requested by the Singapore Medical Council to take charge of the administration and secretariat functions of the SMC-CME programme. It would be an onerous task for the College Secretariat staff but with the strong support from both the Council Members and its good secretariat backing, we should be able to play an important role.

The first batch of GP trainees in Family Medicine would be taking the Master of Medicine (Family Medicine) examinations to be conducted by the School of Postgraduate Medical Studies, National University of Singapore in July this year.

College has built good rapport with the Ministry of Health and other medical organisations too. On the international level, Dr Goh was one of the four members of the WONCA study team to China. Their report had been accepted by the Ministry for Health in China and he had requested that the report be circulated to all Medical Schools in China. Dr Alfred Loh is a member of the WONCA Executive.

1. MINUTES OF THE 21ST ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING HELD ON SUNDAY, 19 JULY 1992

There were no amendments to the minutes. The adoption of the minutes was proposed by Dr Frederick Lee and seconded by Dr David Lim. There were no objections.

2. MATTERS ARISING

The meeting went through the matters arising out of the minutes. The House was informed that for the Albert Lim Award, Dr Wong Heck Sing and his family will continue with the funding of the Award.

For Item 7, Chairman informed the House that with his appointment as President of College, the vacancy of a Vice President was filled by Dr Lim Lean Huat who was appointed by the Council on 19 August 1992 to be its Vice President. He has been a valuable member in Council.

3. ANNUAL REPORT OF THE THIRTEENTH COUNCIL FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 1993

3.2 The meeting went through the various Committee activites for the Annual Report 1992-1993 as follows:

3.2.1 REPORT OF THE THIRTEENTH COUNCIL 1 April 1992 to 31 March 1993

This Report had reflected the various Committees and Council activities for the past year.

Members were informed by the Chairman that the theme for the WONCA 1993 Asia-Pacific Conference held on 6 February was 'Family Medicine Agenda In the 21st Century'. Prior to that Conference, there was a workshop participated by 14 countries. This workshop had worked out a core curriculum for family medicine and WONCA had given a grant of US\$8000/- for the printing of the curriculum to be distributed to all doctors around the world.

Members were informed that for the SMC-CME programme, the administration and secretariat functions would be carried out by the College's secretariat. A free-lance programmer had written a database to capture the CME activities participated by doctors. Chairman added that the data could useful for research on the learning patterns of the doctors in Singapore.

On the question of the SMC Specialist Register, Dr Lim Kim Leong said that the SMC Specialist Register Committee had prepared a report for the Specialist Register earlier and this had to be reviewed again.

For the past financial year 1992/1993, there were resignations from the Associate membership due to members proceeding to overseas postings; members accompanying their spouses on overseas assignments.

3.2.2 REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CENSORS 1 April 1992 to 31 March 1993

Dr Goh Lee Gan informed that there were 17 candidates for the first Master of Medicine (Family Medicine) examinations to be held from 12 to 18 July 1993.

The examination format would be based on that of the MCGP. For the clinical examinations, there will be long cases, one in Paediatrics and one in Medicine. There will be 4 short cases and practice log. MCGP holders were exempted from the written papers. They must sit for the Practice log segment.

Professor Denis Pereira Gray from the British College of General Practitioners, UK and Dr Lindsey Knight, immediate past Censor-in-Chief from the Royal Australian College had been invited by the National University of Singapore to be its external examiners.

Members were informed by Dr Ling Sing Lin that the degree of the Master of Medicine (Family Medicine) would be recognised at par with other Master of Medicine postgraduate degrees by the Ministry of Health for salary increment and promotion.

This M Medicine (Family Medicine) degree is recognised as entry to the exit certification programme of the School of Postgraduate Medical Studies, NUS.

3.2.3 REPORT OF THE CONTINUING MEDICAL EDUCATION COMMITTEE 1 April 1992 to 31 March 1993

The Continuing Education Committee (CME) Committee and its Chairman were commended for their efforts to put up a variety of CME activities for the past year.

Dr David Lim would like to see a more structured form of CME for its members, so that at the end of the CME courses, one would be awarded with a Certificate or Diploma of any discipline in which attendances were taken. Dr Richard Ng, the Chairman of the Continuing Education Committee reported that the Committee had met the Department of ENT, National University Hospital to discuss the possibility of conducting half-day afternoon clinical attachment sessions for members. In this half-day clinical attachments, the General Practitioners will be seeing cases with the consultants.

3.2.4 REPORT ON THE FAMILY MEDICINE TRAINING PROGRAMME

Dr Lee Suan Yew asked why there was a drop of trainees for this programme.

Dr Goh replied that the reasons for the decrease of attendances were due to the non-committed efforts by some trainees because there was no penalty from the Ministry of Health should they not complete the whole course satisfactorily. Another reason was that of late there was a rumour in the press that in future, before any doctor could set up a practice, there would be a need for them to have a recognised postgraduate qualifications. Hence, doctors are trying to set up clinics before such a ruling would be implemented.

Dr Goh gave the House an idea of how the postgraduate training in Master of Medicine (Family Medicine) worked. He informed that there were 2 course of directions to take. The first direction was that trainees would need to be on a 3 year programme with 2 years of hospital rotation in addition to a one year posting in Government polyclinic in the third year. For those doctors in the general practice, participants would require to have 6 years of general practice and to have to undergo a 2 years of supervised training. In the latter, each doctor would be assigned a supervisor who would be his tutor for 2 years. At the same time, he would need to attend a part-time modular FMTP at College.

3.2.5 REPORT OF THE UNDERGRADUATE TEACHING COMMITTEE 1 April 1992 to 31 March 1993

Dr Lim Lean Huat, Chairman of the Undergraduate Teaching Committe informed the House that he had received favourable feedback from the undergraduates regarding the clinical attachments. They lamented that the one week of clinical attachment were rather short.

At this juncture, Dr Goh informed the House the Curriculum Committee of the university had discussed the possibility of having brief sessions at the General Practitioners Clinic besides the one week posting.

Dr Loh thanked the clinical tutors for their contributions in teaching the undergraduates. He mentioned that that was not easy for them as their pace of attending to patients would be slower than normal.

3.2.6 REPORT OF THE RESEARCH COMMITTEE 1 April 1992 to 31 March 1993

The House was informed of the various activities done by the Research Committee for the past year.

Its Chairman, Dr Choo Kay Wee reported on 13th July, the Ministry of Health, together with the Singapore Medical Association, the College and Academy of Medicine, Singapore, will conduct a "One Day Morbidity Pattern in Singapore". He assured that information collected during the survey would be treated in the strictest confidence and urged members to cooperate by returning the survey forms.

In the pipeline of the Research Committee, Dr Choo mentioned that there would be a survey on hypertension.

3.2.7 REPORT OF THE PUBLICATIONS COMMITTEE 1 April 1992 to 31 March 1993

Members were informed of the delay in the publications of the Singapore Family Physicians journal, Vol XVIII issues numbers 3 and 4.

3.2.8 REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE 1 April 1992 to 31 March 1993

The Honorary Treasurer, Dr Soh Cheow Beng informed the House that it was increasingly difficult to get sponsors from equipment firms and drug companies for courses. He added that with each deficits, withdrawals had to be obtain from the Fixed Deposits.

Chairman envisaged that in the near future, there would be a need to raise course fees and that non members would be made to pay higher fees.

3.2.9 REPORT OF THE PRACTICE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE 1 April 1992 to 31 March 1993

There was no report by its Chairman, Dr Huan Meng Wah.

3.2.10 REPORT OF THE FOURTH SCIENTIFIC CONFERENCE 1 April 1992 to 31 March 1993

Dr Lee Suan Yew suggested that the College could co-organise with neighbouring countries to combine a holiday trip with the Conference.

The Annual Report for 1992-1993 and the various Council Committees Reports were proposed by Dr Alfred Loh and seconded by Dr Kwan Kah Yee.

4 AUDITED ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 1993

Further to Dr Soh's comments during the discussion on the Finance Committee Report, Dr Loh said that College must be self-sufficient in most functions and that in the near future, to increase its revenue, College may need to increase its course fees. It will have to try to minimise the possible increase.

Dr Lee Keng Thon proposed acceptance of the accounts for the year ended 31st March 1993. Dr Lau Hong Choon seconded.

5 PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

5.1 Change of College's name

The change of College's name had been debated in and out of Council for quite sometime. In most colleges overseas, Family Medicine reflected more accurately the sentiments of the care providers. Most colleges had moved towards the discipline of Family Medicine. Thus, it was now timely to change

College's name and incorporate the terms Family Physicians and Family Medicine.

Dr Alfred Loh proposed that the House vote on the change of College's name. Dr Richard Ng seconded it. There was a strong vote of 41 for the change of name, with 1 voted against and 2 members abstained.

The change of College's name to "College" or "Academy" was next voted. There were thirteen votes for the name to be changed to "Academy". Twenty-one members would like it to remain unchanged as the "College". There were six who abstained.

Next the following names suggested by the House were listed:

- (a) College of Family Physicians Singapore
- (b) Singapore College of Family Physicians

It was accepted by a unanimous vote of the House that the new name be "College of Family Physicians Singapore".

5.2 Increase of Council Members

As the College Council has increased its various Committees, Dr Loh proposed that the present Council members be increased by two. Dr Leong Vie Chung seconded. There was unanimous acceptance for the increase of the Council members.

2 COUNCIL ACTIVITIES

2.1 White Paper on Affordable Health Care

A joint stand in support was taken by the College, Singapore Medical Association (SMA) and the Association of Private Medical Practitioners Singapore (APMPS) on this National Policy paper. It was released in the SMA newsletter and the local press.

2.2 NTUC Managed Healthcare System

The College was involved in the dialogue with NTUC Income through its participation in the joint committee of SMA, APMPS and CFPS. Useful suggestions and modifications to the scheme were made during discussions held with NTUC Income.

2.3 SMC-CME Programme

The programme had been progressing smoothly since the College took over the administration in July 1993. A software programme was commissioned to monitor the CME points accumulated by participants. 106 participants had already qualified for the Recognition Award Certificate even though the programme deadline is on 30 June 1994.

2.4 Advanced Training Programme for Family Medicine

No progress had been made in the institution of the advanced training for family physicians who had obtained higher qualifications like MCGP(Singapore) and M.Med (Family Medicine).

2.5 Family Values

A survey of Family Physicians' opinions on family values was conducted by the Research Committee in October 1993 and a paper was submitted to the Committee on the Family to assist the Committee on its efforts of drafting the document of family values as proposed by the former Health and Community Development Minister, Mr Yeo Cheow Tong.

2.6 Increase of Council Members

At the 22nd Annual General Meeting held on 27 June 1993, our Constitution was amended to increase the number of Council Members from 5 to 7. At the 6th Meeting of the 14th Council held on 17 November 1993, Dr Lee Kheng Hock and Dr Yeo Khee Hong were co-opted as new Council Members.

2.7 Change of College's Name

The College's name was officially changed to "College of Family Physicians Singapore" on 17 November 1993 after both the Comptroller of Income Tax and the Registrar of Societies had been informed and no objection was raised.

The Family Medicine Training Programme consists of Saturday afternoon lectures conducted in the first two years of the three year Family Medicine Training Programme. There are 8 modules to be covered in the two years. The College of Family Physicians Singapore is given the responsibility of administering this course.

In the third year of the Family Medicine traineeship programme, participants are given supervised training based at the Government Polyclinic with attachments to School Health Services, Training & Health Education Department, Senior Citizens Healthcare Centre, a general practice clinic. There were 4 Family Medicine trainees in the 1993-1994 third year programme.

The M.Med (Family Medicine) Programme is also available to practising family physicians. It consists of the following training requirements :

- 1. 6 years in family practice of which 2 years are to be under supervision;
- 2. Attendance of the 2 years of modular course (the Family Medicine Training Programme).

Attention is being focussed this year on developing the Family Physician stream. There is a need to appoint more Family Physician supervisors.

New Directions

On 17th April 1994, the clinical tutors met for an informal discussion and to exchange ideas. 3 new suggestions were brought up:

- (i) "Mentor-scheme" whereby GP tutors adopt a few undergraduates from first to final year of medical training. We happily noted, many family physicians were already doing this on an informal basis. This scheme would give students an opportunity to relate to an "older and wiser" member of the fraternity. Hopefully, they would also glean many valuable lessons on life and medicine from their mentors. Who, then, is better suited to the task than our own General Practitioners?
- (ii) Another idea was brought forward regarding the "adoption" of a family e.g. a pregnant mother and her family, by the undergraduate from year one onward. The student can then follow the family through pregnancy, delivery and even the first few years of life. We believe this is a good way for the undergraduate to gain insight to the practice of Family Medicine.
- (iii) Lastly, the possible grouping of the GP-tutors into zones was mentioned. This allows the student the opportunity to visit different types of GP practices. Also, if desired, integrated teaching programmes can be arranged by the GP-tutors in the same zone. Although a good idea, we felt this to be slightly premature at this stage, in view of our current limitations, e.g. brevity of posting-time etc.

A memorandum on the first two suggestions had been sent to the Dean, Faculty of Medicine, NUS. Finally, we would like to conclude with these excerpts from the Students' Feedback on the Undergraduate-GP programme.

"For the GP posting, 2 students to 1 tutor gives more attention to the teaching and assurance that the learning message is conveyed. Being posted to a very helpful tutor, I benefitted greatly. In the practical setting (of the clinic) one can learn the difference between theoretical management and actual management".

"The one week attachment to a private GP is very educational, not only medically but also in other areas of running a clinic, as well as handling and counselling patients. The GP gives a different perspective of the profession compared to that of the hospital setting. The GP posting helps me to see the other side of the coin."

"The posting helped me to clear up misconceptions about the work of a GP and highlight the importance of selective history and physical examination in the GP setting."

For those amongst us who are still wondering if the students have gained from their postings, the above comments should dispel all doubts. Once again, a big "Thank You" to all our GP tutors.

The Research Committee conducted a survey on our members' opinion on family values. The findings of this survey were submitted to the Ministry of Community Development as part of our College's contribution to our nation's effort to inculcate good family values. We have also been invited to participate in their public forum and other activities aimed at promoting family values.

The Finance Committee had recommended continued caution on expenditure this financial year, saving the College a 24% decrease from \$174, 888.00 the previous year to \$132, 667.00. At the same time our income for the year increased by 21% from \$137, 922.00 in the previous year to \$166, 953.00. This landed us with a healthy income of \$34, 286.00 instead of a deficit that was in the amount of \$36, 966.00 the previous year.

We were able to achieve all these without compromising on the standards of service to our members as well as executing an increase rather than a decrease in the various activities of the College.

The increase in income this year came from several sources, namely :

- a A concerted effort by our administrative staff on a more effective mode of collection of subscription, both current as well as subscription in arrears.
- b Careful planning of programmes especially the Family Medicine Teaching Programme which saw a three-fold increase in fees collected as well as the CME Update Module which were still ever popular with our members.
- c Advertisement and administration income.
- d Administration of the SMC-CME programme which we took over from the SMA and were able to execute effectively.

With our efficient administrative staff, the present trend should continue and I am confident of a build-up of our treasury which will be reflected by an increase in our fixed-deposit savings in the coming year.
